MOTHERS' ADVICE

In honor of Mother's Day and Memorial Day, the Newsletter Staff thought it would be a good time to remember Words of Wisdom given to mothers from Mothers of the Church who have gone home to be with the Lord as well as advice on Love from the late Rev. Alfred Howard. We also pause to wish all mothers Happy Mother's Day, especially the remaining Mothers of the Church: Mo. Mary Jackson, Mo. Louise Johnson, Mo. Mary Grace and Mo. Gladys Walker. These memories are reprinted from the May 1995 issue of the Newsletter.

We posed this question to the Mothers: What advice would you give to mother of today to help them with their children?

MOTHER ROSE TAYLOR: "Faithfully nurture the most precious of gifts, a child. Take the time to teach the values of respect, discipline, responsibility, and the greater value of love. It is a very difficult time to be a parent these days. Discipline is very different than it used to be. You take away one thing, there are so many other things the child can do. There is too much going on in the lives of the children today. I do not envy the mothers of today; they have a most difficult time."

MOTHER ELIZABETH JONES: "Be all you can be in life. Do good unto your children. Teach them the way to live in this wicked world. Teach them to avoid the use of drugs."

MOTHER BEULAH OATES: "Teach your children to carry themselves in a respectable manner. Pray for them at all times. Keep them under your control through discipline. When I was a child, my mother didn't always have to ~peak to us to keep us in line. Sometimes, she would just clear up her throat and that was enough."

MOTHER MARY FORTE "Give your children all the love you can and ask the Lord to bless each of them one by one."

MOTHER LAURA ROBERTS: "Set an example for the children to follow. Take their children to Sunday School. Teach them to use their intelligence and to respect their elders. Take heed to the advice that the elders give."

MOTHER ANNIE SMITH: "Whatever mothers do, they should make sure it is real. Do all your work in the name of the Lord especially raising children. Mothers have to live the life in front of their children so they can know how to live. When I was young you could look at your mother and she would slap you silly. Today, children talk back to parents, and are out in the streets all time of night. You should not be cruel to your children. Talk to them kindly and teach them how to live. Don't be a gatekeeper in hell, live for Jesus."

MOTHER MELLOW BOBB: "My advice to the mothers of children today would be: Teach them to be nice, obedient, and to respect their elders."

MOTHER BERNICE WOOD: "At an early age, turn your children over to God and let Him raise them and you be their guide. It is the mother's responsibility to take care of the children and to teach them to walk the straight and narrow. The Bible says: Enter ye in at the strait gate: for wide is the gate, and broad is the way, that leadeth to destruction, and many there be which go in thereat: Because strait is the gate, and narrow is the way, which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it. Matthew 7: 13-14. Teach them to respect each and every one. Show them love and give them love."

MOTHER JESSIE GREEN: "I would tell mothers to teach their children to follow in Jesus' footsteps. Teach them God's way and the results should be acceptable. When my children were growing up, drugs and crime were not as prevalent as they are today. I taught them to make good choices and before making those choices to think of the consequences. Mothers of today need to teach the children about the dangers of drugs, and to choose their friends carefully. They need to spend time with the children talking and listening to them. Teach them that obedience, respect for others as well as themselves, are very important, but the most important is Love. Love God, yourself and others."

MOTHER OLIVIA WASHINGTON: "Teach your children to respect people. Spend quality time with them. Teach them the values of life including the love of God, the purpose of His Church, and family love."

MOTHER MARY HOUSTON: "I think mothers of today should be able to listen as well as give advice to their children. It seems, mothers are always in a rush and don't have time to listen to their children. Be careful what they watch on TV, children imitate what they see. Bring them up in the church. Support your children rather than drop them off to be supported by others. Listen to what others have to say about your children. Sometimes, I want to say something to someone's child, but I don't for fear of having my feelings hurt by the child and or the mother. Training for the child starts at home. Remember these scriptures: Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not depart from it. Proverbs 22:6; and Children, obey your parents in all things, for this is well pleasing unto the Lord. Colossians 3:20. I count it a Blessing and a Privilege to be a Mother of the Church and as God has blessed me, I would like to be a blessing to the Church."

MOTHER ETHNIE JOHNSON: "First acknowledge Christ as the head of your life. Be loving, respectful and honest. Let your life be a good example. Children follow what they see more than what they hear. Trust God to guide you in everything you do. Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not depart from it. Proverbs 22:6."

MOTHER MARGARET HYLTON: "OUR REFUGE When times are dark and dreary and no one seems to care, our Savior is our refuge, if we go to him in prayer. He's always near to help us and make our burden light, it is like a ray of sunshine even on the darkest night. The Lord will be a refuge in time of trouble. Psalms 9:9. Grace be unto you, and peace, from God our father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ. I Corinthians 1:3"




Congratulations Bro. Daniel Elliott!

Nat Love, aka: Deadwood Dick – Greatest Black Cowboy in the Old West

Mounted on my favorite horse, my ... lariat near my hand, and my trusty guns in my belt ... I felt I could defy the world.

Nat Love in The Life and
 Adventures of Nat Love, 1907

Born in June 1854 as a slave on Robert Love's plantation in Davidson County Tennessee,

Nat (pronounced Nate) Love would grow up to be one of the most famous cowboys in the Old West.

Raised in a log cabin, Nat's father had become a slave foreman on the plantation and his mother worked in the kitchen of the "big house." He was looked after primarily by an older sister when he was young, but she, like her mother, had duties in the kitchen so Nat primarily looked after himself. Though he had no formal education, with help from his father, he learned to read and write.

After the Civil War, when the slaves were freed, Nat's father worked a small farm that he rented from his former master, Robert Love. But freedom was to be short-lived for the former slave, as he died just a few years later. Nat then took various jobs on area plantations to help support the family and found that he had great skill in breaking horses.

In 1869, Love left his family in an uncle's care and headed west with \$50 in his pocket. When he reached Dodge City, Kansas he ran into the crew of the Texas Duval Ranch. Having just brought a herd to the Kansas railhead, the Cowboys were having breakfast when Nat joined them. The young man soon approached the trail boss asking for a job. The boss agreed that Nat could join them if he could break a horse named Good Eye. The wildest horse in the outfit, Nat would later say it was the toughest ride he'd ever had. But ride he did and got the job with the Duval Ranch at \$30 a month. The 16-year-old quickly adapted to the life of a cowboy, showing excellent skills as a ranch hand and practiced so often with a .45 revolver that his shooting skills also became very good. Earning a reputation as one of the best all-around cowbovs in the Duval outfit, he soon became a buyer and their chief brand reader. In this capacity, he was sent to Mexico on several occasions and soon learned to speak fluent Spanish.

After three years with the Duval Outfit, Love moved on to Arizona in 1872, where he went to work for the Gallinger Ranch on the Gila River. There he traveled many of the major western trails, sometimes working in dangerous situations in Indian battles and fighting off rustlers and bandits. During these years as an Arizona cowboy, Nat was referred to as Red River Dick and claimed to have met many of famous men of the West including Pat Garrett, Bat Masterson and Billy the Kid.

In the spring of 1876, the Gallinger cowboys were sent to deliver a herd of three thousand steers to Deadwood, South Dakota. When the crew arrived on July 3rd, the locals were busy preparing for a 4th of July celebration. One of the many organized events included a "cowboy" contest with a \$200 cash prize to the winner. The contestants competed in roping, bridling, saddling, and shooting. Winning every competition, hands down, Nat walked away with the \$200 prize and the nickname of "Deadwood Dick."

Nat continued to work as a cowboy in the southwest for another 15 years before he began to settle down and got married in 1889. The next year he took a job in



Denver, Colorado as a Pullman porter on the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad. As such, he worked on the routes west of Denver and moved his family several times to Wyoming, Utah, and Nevada before finally settling down in southern California.

In 1907, Nat Love published his autobiography, *The Life and*

Adventures of Nat Love, Better Known in the Cattle Country as "Deadwood Dick," a tale that tended to take on the epic proportions more noted in the many "dime novels" of the time. Though he boasts in the book that everything actually happened, there is very little external verification, such as those famous western men that Love allegedly met. In other cases, there are no records for the cattlemen that he said he worked with and for. As to what portion of the book is fact, and what is fiction will never be known; however, that didn't stop the American public, hungry for tales of the west, from avidly reading the book.

Love's last job was working as a courier for the General Securities Company in Los Angeles, California.

HEALTH NEWS

MYTHS AND FACTS ABOUT SHINGLES

What Is Shingles?: When you have chickenpox, the virus that caused it sticks around, even after you get better. Later on, that virus can trigger another infection called shingles, which is known for a painful rash with blisters.

Myth: Only Older People Get Shingles: While the infection is more common in people over 50, anyone who's had chickenpox can get it, even children. Younger people are more likely to have it if their immune systems are weak because of certain medicines or illnesses like cancer or HIV.

Myth: Shingles Is Rare: About a third of all Americans will get it in their lifetimes. That's 1 million per year. Half of people who reach age 85 will have had shingles at some point.

Myth: It's Not Contagious: The open blisters of the rash can't pass on shingles, but they can spread the chickenpox virus to someone who's never had it. And that can lead to a later shingles outbreak.

Myth: Chickenpox Is the Same Thing: They're caused by the same virus, but shingles and chickenpox are not the same illness. Chickenpox brings on hundreds of itchy blisters that heal in 5 to 7 days, usually in children. A shingles rash can last about a month.

Myth: It's Gone in a Few Days: About 40% of people who get shingles feel a burning, shooting pain for months or years after the rash is gone. It's called postherpetic neuralgia, or PHN. Your doctor can help you manage it with medication and other treatment.

Myth: You Can't Treat It: If you take an antiviral medicine (acyclovir, famciclovir, valacyclovir) in the first 3 days after the rash appears, that may ease the pain and help you get rid of it sooner. The earlier you start, the better it works. Prescription and over-the-counter pain relievers, corticosteroids, and nerve block treatments might also help.

Myth: You Can't Get It More Than Once: It doesn't happen often, but it's possible. New bouts usually show up on different parts of your body. A shingles vaccine could lower your chances of a

second infection, even if you get the shot after you've already had shingles.

Myth: The Rash Is the Biggest Problem: Aside from nerve pain caused by PHN, your skin can get infected, and you might have scarring, headache, fever, stomachache, or muscle weakness. Talk to your doctor as soon as you notice symptoms so you can get treatment.

Fact: A Vaccine Can Help Prevent It: It doesn't guarantee you won't get shingles, but a vaccine can lower your chances by more than 90%. And if you do get the condition, it might not affect you as much. The CDC recommends that healthy adults 50 or older get two doses of the vaccine Shingrix, 2 to 6 months apart, unless they currently have shingles, are pregnant, or a test shows they've never had chickenpox.

Fact: Stress Can Trigger Shingles: Stress can weaken your immune system and make you more likely to have an outbreak. Or it may simply run you down until you get a cold or some other illness that triggers one. And once you have shingles, stress can make the pain worse.

Fact: It Can Cause Vision Loss: If shingles makes your eye or eyelid red, swollen, or painful -- sometimes called ocular shingles -- it can be serious. Get medical help as soon as possible because it could lead to glaucoma, scarring, or even blindness. Blisters on the tip of your nose can be an early warning sign.

Fact: The Rash Can Get Infected: If blister pain and redness don't get better -- or get worse -- over a couple of weeks, you could have a bacterial skin infection. See your doctor right away. It can make you heal more slowly and scar your skin.

Fact: Shingles Can Hurt Your Brain: It doesn't happen often, but shingles around your eyes, ears, forehead, or nose can sometimes lead to brain swelling, paralyze part of your face, or affect your hearing and balance. In rare cases, an infection in these areas can lead to a stroke or meningitis (when tissues around your brain and spinal cord get infected and inflamed).
